
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

We can't be blamed for wanting that, but it seems like we want to do all the celebrating of Christmas before Christmas, and we're ready to forget about it on December 26.

At Gethsemane and at other churches like ours, during most of December we celebrate the season of Advent. While many other people are consuming their Christmas cheer early, we are waiting. While many other places are covered in red and green and Christmas lights, we wear a calming shade of blue.

Here in the church, we're not driven by consumer needs. We know that the best things are worth waiting for and sometimes the anticipation is the best part.

I've heard that some Lutheran pastors have had people coming to their churches and expecting them to be decked out in trees and lights and festive Christmas images like shopping malls and stores. Some churches have succumbed to this pressure and have started celebrating Christmas early with the rest of the world.

But I like to think of church during December as a place where we can take a break from all that. Where we can still live in hope of what is to come instead of wishing that it would just be done with. Where I can under-achieve and wait for God to do the work. Where we can still be surprised by the birth of the savior of the world to a poor girl from Bethlehem. Church during December is where we do Christmas on God's time, not the world's. This December don't forget to celebrate Advent – don't forget to wait.


And introducing . . . OWLs. No, not those fascinating birds with the big eyes, although they are really cute.

Faith Mission to Move in 2013

Several years ago, when the area around the Faith Mission downtown campus started to develop, we began planning for a possible relocation of some of our facilities to a larger and better equipped building. We are happy to say that this relocation of our services has now become a reality, and the project is now underway. The relocation project,

projected to be complete in the first quarter of 2013, will result in the ability to provide additional meals to those who are hungry as well as better overall services to our residents.

The location of our new facility at 245 N. Grant St. is 2 blocks away from the current Faith Mission and will hold the Community Kitchen, vision, dental and medical clinics, as well as administrative offices. Currently, the Community Kitchen, which serves anyone in the community who is hungry, serves three meals each day, 365 days a year. Between 800 and 1,200 people use the service daily, many crowding into a handful of picnic-style steel tables. At the new location, the number of people served at one sitting will nearly triple, and this means less people will have to wait outside for a meal, offering a greater sense of dignity to those we serve and also serving as a less disruptive operation to the shelter residents currently residing at Faith Mission. The dining facilities and other rooms at the new building will be brighter, more comfortable and simply more pleasant for users.

Some highlights of the relocation project:

- Seating capacity in dining room goes from 48 to 124, which eliminates the need for shift dining
- Actual shelters will remain in their current locations (6th, 8th and Nancy's Place)
- New facility will hold the Community Kitchen, vision, dental and medical clinics, and administrative offices
- Relocation of the Community Kitchen will ensure only shelter residents have access to the shelter building
- More dignity for clients have separate living space area only for residents, women's shelter residents no longer have to walk through the men's day space to eat
- Those seeking services will not have to wait outside, and if they do, it will not be for as long
- Easier accessibility for volunteers/ donors
- Relocation and layout will promote operational and staff efficiency

Children Welcome at the Communion Table

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them." – Matthew 19:14

We believe that the communion table we share is not our table, but God's table. Jesus' table was a table of welcome for all. When Jesus ate with people, he did not first determine if they had been confirmed, completed a class, or whether they were sinless or repentant. He did not require that everyone understood fully what was happening. None of us fully understands the mystery of God's presence for us in the bread and wine. Gethsemane surely embraces this in our practices.

In the past many churches have had requirements for sharing communion, especially children. We usually waited for children to reach a certain age and then they would complete a series of classes and then they would be allowed to take communion with the rest of the congregation. Many other churches (including Gethsemane) used to wait until young people were confirmed.

We, of course, believe that the children are part of Gethsemane's family. We want them to be full members of this community with no restrictions on their participation in our practices and their experience of God.

Last year we began allowing children or any age to take communion whenever parents wanted them to take it. I encouraged parents to let children start taking communion whenever they showed interest in sharing it. We would then offer ongoing, age-appropriate education for all our children about the wonderful gift we share.

This past year, several children have begun taking communion. Each child did it differently. Some did it quietly, some started and stopped and started again, some waited and shared a celebration with their families. We celebrate these children, their relationship with God and their receiving this sacrament this year:
